Preschool BC: The preschool enjoyed a really strong enrollment this year and many milestones including working towards a full day program from 8 am to 5:30 pm which kicked off slowly but we are encouraged by the interest from new families on tours. We had many many successful programs including but not limited to class coffees, Shabbat dinners at Tamar's home with Rabbi Dara and congregants, Night at Tamar's, Sukkot at Avital's, Purim Spiel by the preschool teachers, Yellers Anonymous Group Meetings, lectures and more. By the end of February, preschool for the fall was 95% enrolled and we had dozens of families lined up for preschool tours.

Preschool DC: The preschool closed Friday March 13th and has remained physically closed since. However, our teaching went into virtual mode immediately and has not stopped. Teachers have been amazing: learning how to use tech, coming up with creative methods for teaching our youngest members and keeping connections with families. Tamar and Avital have been hosting live challah bakes on Fridays with members from across the synagogue community. They have also hosted Pandemic Parenting sessions every Wednesday evening.

Preschool AC: We are preparing to open, God willing, on July 6 for a six-week summer program. Many members from across the synagogue community and professionals from across multiple disciplines have been meeting with us to ensure the safest and most efficient opening not only for the preschool but for our community in general. Protocols from the CDC, California Community Care Licensing, medical professionals, LA County Dept of Health and more have been on our team to ensure health and safety protocols of the highest standards and beyond.

This past year was a year of great success and significant transition for the K-12 Education and Engagement department. Our Religious School, Camp Isaiah, and Youth Group programming are as strong as they have ever been. And the mere fact that we are reporting to you all the successes and challenges of all three of these program areas together, represents an exciting shift. It is a shift in the way we think about, design and deliver education and engagement as a community. As we boldly experiment with and strengthen our programmatic offerings, our core remains the same – we are committed to building strong relationships at the intersection of tradition and innovation.

Our year in numbers

- 300: the number of campers who participated in Camp Isaiah last summer
- 66: the number of campers who participated in our new Adventure & Leadership Junior Counselor-In-Training Program
- 18: the number of teens who served as CIT's and Madrichim at Camp Isaiah

- 34: the number of teens who participated in our Rishonim program (our largest group of Rishonim to date)
- 16: the number of teens on the ITY Board (our teen youth group)

- 150: the average number of families that logged into *Tefillah* with Danny on Sunday mornings since we moved from in-person to virtual programming
